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#### TO CONCLUDE



#### **WORKIN' ON MAKING YOU HAPPY**

The Isaac Knapp District Dental Society does a great job of supporting its members in their pursuit of lives full of joy and happiness both professionally and personally. However, it is up to each dentist individually to bear that final responsibility for ensuring a great work life balance.

If our lives as dentists were a performance, there would be two main characters in the play: 1) Our Work Self and 2) Our Personal Time Self. It is incumbent on

each of us to ensure that both receive equal screen time. Let's be honest though: that can be really hard!!

More and more work has become a large part of our personal identity. This makes sense as it can truly feel like a noble calling to work in a profession like dentistry where the service of patients improves their health, function, and confidence on a daily basis. Sacrificing things on a personal level in pursuit of that calling can then be a little too easy with our personal lives sometimes paying the price. Taking the best of ourselves to work for our patients and our dental teams, while leaving the leftovers for family and friends is not a recipe for success or a happy life.

Everyone is familiar with the famous quote: "Love what you do, and you'll never work a day in your life." It is equally noble to follow this lesser-known quote: "Do what you must while at work so that you can do what you love when you're not working." Neither is a more noble pursuit than the other. So, what kinds of rules can we follow to improve our work life balance? Let's explore a few here:

- Your self-worth is not tied solely to your career.
   Spend some time considering all of the ways that you matter. You might just be surprised to find out that the work that you do is only a small contributor to your overall sense of self-worth.
- Take some time to rest! And do it now! We tend
  to trick ourselves into resting at a later date once
  we have had a chance to complete a certain

amount of work, projects, events, etc. The problem with this is that burnout can creep in and cause us to stop wanting to work at all. Taking time to rest at regular intervals keeps our cups full so that we are always ready to engage with life both professionally and personally.

- Stop looking for the perfect job. A good enough job will do. "Good enough" means different things to different people. The important thing to recognize is once you've found that good enough job. Redirecting all that energy that you spend thinking about all of the ways your current job does not measure up can be better spent elsewhere: projects at work, relationships with patient/staff members, hobbies, family/friends/etc.
- Personal time does not need to be structured or optimized! While there are benefits to being efficient and optimizing our time at work, we should not carry over the same kind of habits into our personal/leisure time. Set time aside for leisure, but then let the fun/play naturally happen at its own pace. Fun/leisure is not about being productive.
- Find several non-work identities. Maybe it's a
  player on an athletic team, a musician in an
  orchestra, a volunteer at a soup kitchen, etc.
  Having more roles other than that of your job helps
  us to be more well rounded and resilient.
- Define your relationship with work. Often our employers are happy to do that for us.



#### LEARN HOW TO COMPLY WITH NEW DEA **GUIDELINES FOR PRESCRIBING** CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES.

The Medication Access and Training Expansion Act, or MATE Act, was included in the omnibus spending bill that passed Congress at the end of 2022. This new law requires dentists to complete eight hours of one-time training before receiving or renewing a Drug Enforcement Administration registration.

#### WHO DOES IT INVOLVE?

The federal training requirement applies to any dentist who requires a DEA registration to prescribe controlled substances (Schedules II, III, IV, and V). Those who do not need a DEA registration are not affected

#### WHEN DOES THIS TAKE EFFECT?

"Compliance is not required before June 30; however, the exact date is relative to when the prescriber first obtains or next renews their DEA registration," according to the MATE Act.

#### WHERE DO I FIND MORE INFORMATION?

To help dentists comply with the new requirements, the ADA has created an FAQ addressing common questions the Association has heard from members.



## Honduras

The first thing I noticed was the smell. Mountain air mixed with wild flowers and something hard to identify - fresh and warm, slightly foreign and sweet. The sunlit mountains were a welcome sight off the plane, and we were greeted with a amiability I will forever associate with the people of Honduras. After a long day of traveling, schlepping too many bags to count, and an impressive display of Tetris-stacking said bags tenuously on a heavily-burdened truck, we arrived in Comayagua to the gracious hospitality of the La Posada de mi Viejo Hotel. About thirty road weary travelers settled in, eager to get to work for Sonrisas Siempre, following our fearless leader, Dr. Tom Blake ("el Jefe"), into the trenches! Erm, clinic.

The group descended on the clinic with enthusiasm from the get go: cleaning, organizing, taking stock, and otherwise prepping for the patients that would arrive first thing the next morning. Those who had been before took to their posts like seasoned pros, gently directing the rest of us "busy bees" to any task that needed attention. Some of us (me) had to take a few minutes to take it all in, wondering how it would all work without all the accoutrement of a modern dental office. I needn't have worried. The expediency and professionalism of this crew worked their magic, and the clinics were set up and ready to rock in no time.

The first day might have been chaos: bus loads of children lining up to be screened, four dental chairs, five hygiene chairs, a make-shift command center and a sterilization hub all getting prepped for a whirlwind of work. But it wasn't chaos. It was a well-oiled machine that Dr. Blake had meticulously organized and sorted from years of experience and partnerships. We had the support of the Lion's Club, the amazing students and translators, and plenty of seasoned docs, like Drs. Jill "Bums" Burns, and Mara Carey-Williams, who knew the ropes. I dusted off my kitchen Spanish and threw myself into helping screen the first day – and quickly found myself wishing I had anything close to some

dental knowledge. Being an "Aspiring Dentite" (not a doctor, but a lawyer by training; and Dentist-Adjacent by way of my sister, Caroline Derrow), I wanted to be of help and learn anything I could to contribute. Luckily, I found everyone - from doctors and assistants, to hygienists and students - willing to explain things and teach me as we went. And it was fascinating! I watched extractions, crowns, root canals, all while docs patiently and professionally explained what was happening, and even let me mask-up and lean precariously over shoulders to observe. Dr. Nate Heffelfinger was especially gracious in pointing out interesting observations; Dr. Dave Wolf let me lurk over his shoulder in the mountain clinic as he extracted a dizzying number of teeth; Dr. Joseph Platt adeptly talked me through a complicated root canal as it happened, and Dr. Matt Kolkman allowed me to watch as he explained a complicated procedure - something I'll never forget (what... was it again?). Ian Broad-White and Jenny Garn coordinated patients with the dexterity of a six-armed person while playing energetic music and creating a cheerful atmosphere. I gratefully assumed the role of "steri-fairy" and did my best to keep the sterilization efforts running on time, just keeping up, as I watched every member of our team doing more than I could fathom, each day.

All the docs worked at a speed I found nothing short of impressive, but never was the mood anything but calm and professional – putting every patient at ease. Dr. Caroline Derrow completed an astonishing 60+ crowns on tiny teeth, often connected to nervous little bodies, expertly soothed and assured by her deft hands. I observed these docs convene to discuss cases in a thoughtful and collegiate way, giving compassionate chairside manner to each patient. In only a week's time, over 550 patients were seen and tended to. That included 252 cleanings, 580 extractions, 618 restorations, 18 root canals, 79 crowns, and RCT on 9 teeth. Those figures should be astonishing – but Dr. Blake's team took it in stride, as I

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## **VISION**

I have horrible eyesight. I have needed some sort of corrective lenses since elementary school. I wear contact lenses most of the time, but often in the wee hours of the morning, I try to fumble around my familiar home almost blindly. However, it is in those moments that I often "see" things that I'm blind to when I wearing my corrective lenses. My heightened sense of potential barriers

increases in an attempt to prevent an accident. Is there a dog toy at the foot of my bed just waiting to startle me where I'd normally step over? Perhaps the alignment of a bench in my room is in prime real estate for toe stubbing. It isn't the clarity of sight allowing me to see those things, but instead the opportunity to venture out of my comfort zone and enter into an area that I may normally avoid that generates a new vision.

We have some upcoming opportunities for Isaac Knapp members and our dental community to step out of their comfort zone with the purpose of growth and solution-finding. Like corrective lenses, we sometimes need the perspective of others to help clarify what we are seeing or show a better path.

We will be hosting an Access to Care Thinktank/
Symposium on Friday, April 21st from 8 am noon. Even if you don't currently have any IDD
patients, I want to encourage you or your staff to
participate and share your voice with your peers
about ideas we can do in northeast Indiana. If you do
see a significant volume of IDD patients, WE NEED
YOU! Your experience can help others!

We have the opportunity to hear from industry leaders who are addressing the current access to care crisis in dentistry facing IDD patients. Even more importantly, the format of the event will bring everyone to the same level of vision of the problem with the opportunity for us to share concerns,

frustrations, and solutions. CEO of Sensory Health, Ben Hudson, will share simple techniques and setups that you can implement in your dental office tomorrow to ensure the success of patients with sensory issues. The AWS Foundation has generously offered a free sensory bags equipped with tools to alleviate stressors of IDD patients with anxiety. Each dental office represented will receive a sensory bag.

Currently, Isaac Knapp is preparing to launch our first ever cohort of the **Future Leaders of Isaac Knapp** (or FLIK for short!). Vision is among the first lessons in the training modules. We understand the importance of providing dentists of IKDDS with a program for self-discovery, business planning, clinical development, and mentorship - **to explore their personal and professional vision**.

We will teach skills useful for leading yourself, leading your dental team, and leading your patients in an environment of collegiality and mentorship.

CONSIDER: 2021 ADA Member Well Being Survey:

- 38% agree with the statement "I sometimes doubt my own confidence." (27% agreed in 2003).
- Results from 2021 indicate younger dentists continue to be disproportionately affected by mental and emotional health concerns. This age group was less likely to feel in control of their


Like: life-altering, mood-enhancing, ruinous to all lesser coffees outstanding. Positive takeaway.

work environment, reported a higher level of stress at work, and scored higher on a depression scale. Younger dentists, who may benefit from additional support, were the least likely to be aware of a state dentist well-being program available through their dental association.

Last year, responses from our 2022 IKDDS Member Survey (45 respondents, 6 non-members) supported the need for IKDDS to create opportunities for community. When asked which member benefits need the most improvement, the following responses came in:

- 38% friendship, peer support and mentorship
- 5% opportunities for leadership
- 10% opportunities for community involvement
- 15% CE

For over a year, we have been developing a 7 module program to equip participants to become better leaders personally, for their dental team, and for their patients! With 44 hours of continuing education that includes clinical training, our goal of

this program is cultivate leaders in dentistry as well as build relationships with your peers.

We look forward to launching this program in September. If you are attending our Spring social event, Past Presidents & Future Leaders event, you will have the opportunity to hear more. This program will be valuable to many of you no matter where you are in your professional journey!

I am proud of the many leaders who have lead this dental society in the past and look forward to the opportunity to develop new leaders. 
